

The GREEN CHRISTIAN Prayer Guide for the Care of Creation:

I was pleased to re-discover this Prayer Handbook recently. It has an entry for each day of the year. I always find them informative, and sometimes stimulating and thought-provoking. Sometimes they stir me to action! For example, here is part of the entry for

Monday 5th March

It reads:

The Church of England is urging Christians to give up single-use plastic for Lent, and adds some tips for cutting out plastics from everyday life, such as: Giving up plastic cups

Using bamboo toothbrushes

Buying unpackaged bread

This is just the beginning of a long haul in the campaign to eliminate plastic waste altogether.

Here are some other examples:

Saturday 10th March

According to Herbert Girardet, cities are the primary location of economic development. However, much damage has been done to the world's ecosystems by urban resource use. The time has come for cities to take specific measures to help regenerate soils, forests and watercourses rather than just sustaining them in a degraded condition, and to make renewable energy their main source of energy supplies. "Regenerative development is as much about honest give-and- take between humans and Nature as it is about reviving human communities at local level.

Monday 19th March

Despite a significant growth in UK electricity demand in the last 60 years, renewables in 2017 produced more electricity than the total electricity used in 1958. The power system in that year emitted 93 million tonnes of CO₂. Renewables in 2017 emitted just 3 million tonnes while producing the same amount of electricity. Last year half of Britain's electricity came from low-carbon sources, while coal and gas output fell by one-tenth.

Saturday 24th March

Tree planting rates in Britain have dropped from 25,000-30,000 per year from the 1960s to 1980s to just 5,000 today, according to Suzi Martineau, organiser of the Glastonbury Tree Conference. David Read of the Forestry Commission, at the same conference picked out Sitka spruce among the trees best capable of fixing CO2. "What is remarkable is that its very high rates of carbon fixation are achieved on land that is too poor for agricultural use, meaning that mitigation of climate change can be achieved without competing for better quality land that can continue to be used for food production."

Dear Friends

Here is a story, only a story, of an old lady, 95 years old. She lived in sheltered housing and was visited one day by her friend, who asked "You look very sad, are you well?"

"Yes, I'm fine," she replied. "Why then, are you looking so fed up?" asked her friend.

"Well," she said, "All my friends have died and have gone to heaven to be with God a long time ago."

"So what is the problem?" the kindly friend asked.

"Well, they'll be wondering where I've gone!"

I suppose we can wonder 'where they have gone', can't we? Far too frequently, the Church is called upon to share in that sad and cruel moment when someone has died, and the family and friends of that person are bereft. What do we say? Should we say anything? What if they take it the wrong way? What if I get stuck for an answer? Someone once said that being a Christian is like being a beggar who has found bread and who goes to tell their fellow beggars where they can be fed also.

We have a responsibility as those who have discovered, not to put too fine a point on it, the best thing ever – namely, that God has made it possible to know him and to live with him forever. How would we feel if the person who helped us to come to faith had simply remained silent? If they had decided to not pass on the wonderful good news that God is in the business of rescuing those who cannot rescue themselves? If we had been left to our own devices and not directed to the one who is 'the Resurrection and the Life'?

I guess the person who helped us simply said what they could. They maybe didn't have the courage and said something about their faith in Jesus, and at some point, it began to make sense to us.

By the time we read this, we will, as a Church and as a Christian Community, be about to celebrate Easter – that moment when the work of Jesus triumphed over death itself. We will share in that wonderful moment and ponder once more what it means to us, and perhaps what it might mean to others. We might reflect on our own experience, our own journey of faith, and we might want to think about telling our nearest and dearest what it means to us. When we die, as we surely will, will our friends and our families wonder where we have gone? Or will they be quite sure where we are and who we are with? They might not have to put up with all the sorrow of our deaths if we have told them where we are going and, more importantly, who it is who makes it possible to be there. Don't we owe it to them?

(Letter from Rev. David Kent)

As I watch the news and read my papers and generally observe what's going on around me, it occurred to me that society today resembles a shop window where all the price tags have been swapped around.

Where the tat suddenly acquires a high price tag whilst the things which are priceless are devalued to become almost worthless.

Try to imagine what some of these goods might be.

Where would we place something like greed in the display?

What about corruption? I wonder if we even recognise corruption for what it is these days. Some people in high places transform corruption into an essential virtue these days.

Celebrity status we worship, wealth in financial terms, rights are highly prized, but we seem to want to separate them from responsibilities, which seems to me like trying to separate a north pole from a south pole on a magnet.

Bad behaviour, bad language, binge drinking, vandalism, graffiti, gadgets, possessions, over indulgence, blaming others, suing people, political correctness, instant gratification, debt, I'm sure you can add plenty of your own.

But what about discipline, what value do we place on discipline?

What about love, peace, respect, responsibility, honour, truth, faithfulness, loyalty, chivalry, prudence, honesty, gentleness, common sense, generosity, courtesy, kindness, self-sacrifice, earning a living, the list goes on.

Virtues which all too often seem to count as worthless these days yet which are transformational when practiced by the majority.

Lent has been a good time for me to take a long hard look at my own shop window and check out which of my labels have become swapped around, as they surely do (few of us are exempt from the pressures of the 'modern world')

To be brutally honest with myself and be prepared to put the labels back where they belong.

If that seems to fly in the face of today's culture then that's because it does.

Christians are now, and always have been, counter-cultural. It's usually the case that if we agree with how society is conducting itself, we've got it wrong.



That's not to say we should be different for the sake of it. It means that without regulation and constant self-examination, the worst aspects of human nature seem to prevail.

As Christian pilgrims, we have the great benefit of periods like Lent which we set aside for self-examination and regulation.

We have special time set aside to sit before God and allow him to prune us back into shape so that we'll bear fruit once again.

It's not enough to come to church once a week. It's not enough to tell people we're Christian

St Francis said "Go out and preach the Gospel; use words if necessary!"

We need to be seen to live out our Christian faith in our lives. That often means by a different set of values than the majority of society.

We march to the beat of a different drum.

We must lead by example. By the Grace of God.

We hold the key to a well ordered society and to a peaceful world.

We are God's messengers.

We are pencils in the hand of God who is writing a love letter to the world.
