As I sit here looking out of my study window at the sunshine which seems like it will never end at the moment and I hear the birds sing and the children play there is a tune going round in my head... “Love is in the air”! It’s amazing how the summer months help us to feel so much better about life and all it has to offer. And of course love is great too – as I listen to the tune in my head it leads me to think about all the songs and films that I can remember with the word love in them. Love is a many splendid thing, All you need is love, Love me tender, The power of love, Young love, Love Actually, Love story and The Love bug to name but a few. And now you’re trying to think of all the ones I missed, aren’t you?! You see love is something we all know about, it’s something we all have in our lives in one guise or another. What is the first thing you think about when someone says the word love to you.

Maybe it's the name of your "significant other" that pops into your head when someone mentions love.

But the word love covers some many things doesn't it. We only have the one word whereas the Ancient Greeks had many words. The word for loving your other half is Eros – just like the statue in Piccadilly Circus depicting the god of love. This love is passionate and romantic and often leads to marriage and family life.

So what about the love we have for our family; the way we love our brothers and sisters, children and grand-children is very different to the way we love our partner. But this love which the Ancient Greeks called Storge is just as important as Eros because without love a family soon disintegrates and breaks up. Families who love one another can achieve so much more than a family that is at war with one another.

Love is what makes the world go around, although there is another song which would suggest that it is money, but I hope I'm right when I say it is love. Even those who have all the money in the world struggle to be happy if they don't have someone to love and indeed someone to love them.

But as well as our family there are also friends who are very important to us and the Ancient Greeks had a word for the love we feel for them too – Philia which simply means an affectionate regard for someone. There is no passion or romance attached to this sort of love but it can still be a deep love that means you would lay your life down for your friends.

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But for me the most important love is the unconditional love of God. The Ancient Greeks called this love Agape. This is a selfless love – a love that gives everything and asks for nothing in return. A love



that keeps on loving even when that love is not returned. A love that never changes or gets annoyed, no matter what. It is a love that can be difficult for us as mere mortals to grasp because even though we want to love one another unconditionally we just can't – there is always something that gets in the way and it's usually the silly things. The toothpaste lid always being left off, the way someone thinks they are always right, the time it takes them to do a job, the tea bags left in the sink, the lack of time and space for yourself – there is always something for us to moan about.

God on the other hand never moans about us. He loves us completely and unconditionally which he proved when he sent his son to die on a cross so that we could be forgiven.

If you look in the bible there are examples of every type of love. You can read about Eros or passionate, romantic love in Genesis 29 where we meet Jacob and Rachael and again in Luke 1 with Mary

and Joseph. Storge, family love is found in Luke 10:38-42 with Mary and Martha and in the story of Joseph and his brothers in Genesis 37. The love that binds friends together, Philia, is shown in the bond between David and Jonathon in 1 Samuel 18 and throughout the gospels with the disciples love for Jesus – a love that saw many of them die for him.

But the greatest love of all, Agape, is seen in throughout the bible as God tries to show the people how to live and love and enjoy the gifts he has prepared for us all. John 3:16 shows how that love is expressed and in Luke 23:34 we see how Jesus reinforced that love as he died.

So as I finish this writing the music is still playing in my head but this time the song is

My Lord, what love is this
That pays so dearly

May go free!
