## Mellow Yellow (Rev David)

This must surely have been the year of the dandelion.

Fields have been so completely yellow as to be easily mistaken for rape seed oil from a distance.



They look beautiful along the grass verges and in the meadows don't they?

But find one in your lawn and it's a very different matter.

I'm sure we've all enjoyed blowing the clocks and watching the little seeds disperse on the wind like miniature helicopters.

Keen gardeners will remove the flowers before they seed to prevent a bumper crop the following year.

It's my belief that God loves dandelions.

Why else would He have sent so many and made them so hardy and such a lovely colour and made them so difficult to pull out.

They also offer a feast for pollinators at a time of year when food is sparse.

Is learning to love dandelions a sign of our spiritual growth I wonder??

Turning to another plant, my favourite wood is Yew. Its cream coloured sap wood and brown/red heart wood make it quite spectacular in my view and its grain pattern is unique.

It is very difficult to obtain by wood carvers such as myself as it is protected. Many of our Yew trees are over 1000 years old and live in church yards.

And it's is very, very hard to carve.

But to take a piece of rough sawn Yew and turn it into a thing of beauty by revealing it's 'inner self' is a great privilege.

We have been very fortunate over the years to accumulate pieces of Yew furniture and I remember years ago being told that the Yew veneer that was in stock was the last and no more could obtained.



### SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

This is preparation for the meeting in September of the United Nations General Assembly

I hope that you will find these useful focus points for prayer during the coming weeks and months.

The dates in [square brackets] refer to the entries in the Green Christian Prayer Calendar where you can find more details, together with some links. (See <u>greenchristian.org.uk/resources/prayer-guide</u> for January 2023)

The 2023 SDG (Sustainable Development Goals) Summit will be convened on 19-20 September 2023, during the United Nations General Assembly high-level week. Heads of State and Government will gather at the United Nations Headquarters in New York to follow-up and review the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). They will carry out a comprehensive review of the state of the SDGs, respond to the impact of multiple and interlocking crises facing the world, and provide high-level political guidance on transformative and accelerated actions leading up to the target year of 2030 for achieving the SDGs.

Sustainable Development Goal 1 - **End poverty in all its forms everywhere**. [Saturday 7th January]

Sustainable Development Goal 2 - End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture. [Monday 9th January]

### Christian Aid Fundraiser

What a great morning we had!

Arrivals at St. Paul's, on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> May, were met by an informal café look. Many of our regulars would not be surprised at this, but it certainly raised a few eyebrows.

In a very eco-friendly way, our tables had been covered with washable cloths or re-used paper ones from the Coronation party at Berry Brow (I don't think any were kept for a third use!) It certainly gave a cheerful welcome.

Most of our tables quickly filled, with about fifty people present, including five young people. Melody, Bruce and Catherine delivered our Christian Aid themed service, including a film informing us about life in Malawi and how the use of 'pigeon peas' has helped villagers to grow a resilient crop to make their own bread. During the service the children were occupied with rolling out playdough (baking) and bread themed colouring activities which they enjoyed showing to all at the end of the service.

Catherine thoughtfully linked the film and the day's readings in her talk and considered how often mighty oaks can grow from tiny acorns. Amongst her examples, locally, were the Charity Shop in Newsome and The Welcome Centre, both providing vital services within our local community.

I don't know the origins of the Christian Aid organisation, but I imagine it was once a small seed in someone's mind; now it is a far-reaching organisation providing a means for people to help themselves in areas where food, clean water and education are not taken for granted.

Following the service, a breakfast of bacon or sausage sandwiches or beans on toast was available, together with toast, coffees or a delicious selection of cakes; hopefully something to suit all tastes. Our waiters ably took the orders around the church, and delivered them to the kitchen staff, who endeavoured to provide the sandwiches as quickly as possible, whilst the teas and coffees were delivered to the tables. It sounded a bit like Master Chef in the kitchen, with shouts of, "5 bacon and 2 sausages," etc. We may not have been quite professional, but, thankfully, calmer people than I kept us on track. Hopefully, "Service" wasn't too delayed.

Our supplies proved adequate to feed those who stayed after our church service, together with friends and family who arrived a little later. We even managed to keep going for some of our friends from the Methodist Church who came after their later service, plus one of our Wednesday gardening team who thought we were starting the food at 12! She shall remain nameless, but it was great to see her and all the people who joined us and helped us to raise the marvellous sum of over £600 which we can send to Christian Aid.

Most grateful thanks are extended to all involved in creating, serving, and sharing in our service and breakfast, plus washing up and returning our church to its traditional seating arrangement. Also, to The Loom Café in Honley who generously donated a coffee & cake voucher for the raffle and to Hinchliffe's Farm Shop for supplying sausages at a very favourable price. All other provisions had been kindly given by other benefactors, grateful thanks to them also.
