They always seemed to have time for everything and had some left over to relax and enjoy.

These days our lives are divided into sections. Work time, family time, recreation time, quality time, down time etc. Every minute of our days and lives is so precious that it is something that must be guarded and protected and accounted for so that it is not wasted. Well, that's how it feels. After all if it is not accounted for, not put to use, it is gone for ever, never to return: an opportunity missed. The chance for learning and to experience new things not put to good use. We hear it all the time; 'I haven't got time to do that'. 'I haven't got time to stop and talk now'. Prayer guide for the care of creation

Here are a few "Prayer Points" from a recent copy of the Green Christian Prayer Guide.

First, some comments about how it was in Kuwait last Summer:

It was so hot in Kuwait last summer that birds dropped dead from the sky, writes Isabel Debre. Sea horses boiled to death in the bay. Dead clams coated the rocks, their shells popped open like they'd been steamed. Kuwait reached a scorching temperature of 53.2 degrees Celsius (127.7 degrees Fahrenheit), making it among the hottest places on earth... By the end of the century, scientists say being outside in Kuwait City could be life-threatening — not only to birds. A recent study also linked 67% of heat-related deaths in the capital to climate change.

And some thoughts about electric vehicles:

Booming electric vehicle sales have spurred a growing demand for lithium. But the light metal, which is essential for making power-packed rechargeable batteries, isn't abundant. Now, researchers report a major step toward tapping a virtually limitless lithium supply: pulling it straight out of seawater, writes Robert F Service in

Science.org... The world's oceans contain an estimated 180 billion tons of lithium. But it's dilute, present at roughly 0.2 parts per million. https://www.science.org/content/article/seawater-could-provide-nearly-unlimited-amounts-critical-battery-material

And also opening an octopus farm:

Recently a Spanish company announced its intention to open a new industrial octopus farm, with a goal of producing 3,000 tonnes of octopus a year. This raises huge concerns for animal welfare — because there can be no doubt that octopuses are complex and intelligent animals... Banking giants Barclays and NatWest have confirmed that shareholders will get the chance to vote on their climate targets at their forthcoming AGMs, for the first time. At NatWest, shareholders will be asked whether they support the bank's "strategic direction" on climate at its AGM in Edinburgh [in April]. Armitage Bridge Ringers

Our article last month chronicled the first peal rung on our bells, our latest efforts are published below. This will not appear in the local press as in days gone by, instead "Bellboard" and "The Ringing World" will print it for all to see.

Since that first success in November 1856 there have been 16 recorded peal performances. Tastes in methods have changed over the years, but the basic format is the same being the required 7 extents each comprising of the 720 available different rows making a total of 5040 changes to be rung. Its interesting to note the time of the first peal taking 2hrs and 51 minutes to complete whereas 2hrs and 32 minutes in modern times would not seem unduly quick.

What doesn't change is retiring to "Berry Brow Lib Club" afterwards for a couple of beers, before moving on to Martha's birthday party, to sit down to a substantial buffet provided by Martha's grandparents. Its also satisfying to hear of the many compliments from locals who enjoyed listening to our efforts, looking forward to hearing our bells ringing out regularly.

Alan, Lorraine and Oliver and wife Sally are all members of the local band Peter is tower captain at Lightcliffe and rings with wife Carole and daughter Rebecca, who is currently studying in Birmingham. Alex learnt to ring at Brighouse, after studying at University and his recent marriage has settled in Huddersfield. Along with his wife Andrea, both are a fantastic addition, joining St. Peters and helping local towers.

Eco Matters

What do we do with the leftovers?

"After everyone had eaten all they wanted, Jesus' disciples picked up twelve large baskets of leftovers." Matthew 14:20

The Feeding of the 5000 is the only one of Jesus' miracles to be recorded in all four gospels, so it must be an important one. It speaks of God's generosity and God's ability to supply abundantly all that we need. But have you ever wondered what happened to those 12 baskets of leftovers? Did they feed them to the birds? Or perhaps take them to the next village and share them out there?



One thing I am pretty certain of is that they will not have simply been 'thrown out'. (Where is 'out', by the way?) Wasting food was definitely not the done thing back then: "Even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the children's' table." Mark 7:28

Food waste today is a very different story. Some of it is wasted on farms, some in the production process, and

some within our homes as we forget what is in the fridge or scrape leftovers into the bin.

Here are a few random facts about food waste for you, some of which really 'boggled' my mind:

- 30%-50% of food produced for human consumption is wasted annually
- The average family in Great Britain wastes nearly £60 a month by throwing away food, in some cases almost an entire meal a day
- Food waste that goes to landfill produces methane, a global warming gas much more harmful than carbon dioxide
- Food waste is responsible for 8% of global warming gases, about twice that of the aviation industry
- Food waste is responsible for over 170 trillion litres of water annually

So what can we do to help address the problem? Here are my 'top tips':

- 1. Plan your meals and make a shopping list so that you buy only what will be eaten.
- Deal with any leftovers you still have by investing in a suitable compost bin, if you have the space (No methane produced this way).
- 3. If you have a garden, grow some of your own vegetables and pick what you need as you need it.
- 4. Buy the 'wonky' fruit and veg which would otherwise be wasted. It's often cheaper too.
- 5. If you have a smartphone then download the 'OLIO' app and offer the food you are not going to eat in time to other people (I once over-catered for a family gathering and was

able to pass on a large tray of sandwiches and snacks this way).

By trying to reduce our food waste we can help to keep global warming as low as possible, save money, save water and almost certainly feed more people – as long as we remember to share.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if, by small changes to our habits, we could point the way to a well-fed, sustainable world –pointing the way to God's kingdom where all life flourishes.
