Armitage Bridge Church on Tuesday, 6th June 2023 between 2pm and 8pm.


Entry fees are £1.00 per exhibit in the Art Section (maximum ten exhibits) and 50p per exhibit in the Craft section. (No maximum).

Armitage Bridge Ringers

We were recently handed a document from a friend of ours who is currently studying in Birmingham. These papers related to a striking competition which took place in Huddersfield on 25 September 1865. Rebecca was given this historical record by the ringers of St Martins in the Bull Ring to pass on to us. As can be seen the prize money was a not insignificant amount for the times; this is reflected in the strict rules and 'test" piece to be rung. Kent Treble Bob would have been popular at the time and to ring either 1600 or 2,000 changes would have taken the best part of 2 hours.

One could ask how this "Trial of Skill on 10 bells" ended up in a cupboard in Birmingham. We can only assume that a team from St Martins entered the competition. We do not know who took part or what the result was. We have approached the Editor of the Examiner to see if they have any records of this in their files.

Each Company will be allowed Three Treble Leads for a practice on the 25th September, when they enter the tower to ring for the Prizes.

The Entrance Money-5s. for each Company-will be required to be sent in on or before the 18th September, or otherwise they will not be allowed to ring.

Joint Companies will be allowed; but no person to ring with more than one Company.

The Ballot for priority of ringing will take place at Seven o'clock in the morning; and any Company not being ready to enter the tower when called upon, will be left over till the last.

The Committee will sit at the house of Mr. George Shaw, the Ramsden's Arms Inn, Cross Church Street, where the Ballot will take place.

Each Company will have four full pulls for each Bell, commencing at the Treble, and so on in rotation to the Tenor. Any Company exceeding four full pulls for each Bell, will have ten faults put on for every full pull over.

After each man has had his four pulls, two minutes will be allowed for round ringing, and then ring the three leads, to stand at the full pull after the single, then two minutes will be allowed for round ringing before commencing the peal, to stand at the end of the peal, the-full pull after single.

If a rope strips the wheel and the Bell will not come back, the Company ringing will be allowed to commence again, and no faults taken up to the time the accident happened; but if the Bell comes back again, and the man cannot get into the peal again, the Company will be disentitled.

If two Bells change places and are put right in the same course before reaching the course end, the peal will be considered true; but if not, the peal will be considered false, and the Company disentitled to the Prizes.

One competent man from the Huddersfield Company, along with a Conductor from the other Companies, will sit in the tower with each Company, and Conductors will have to sit in the following order, viz; the last but one with the first, the last with second, the first with third, the second with fourth, the third with fifth, and so in rotation, any Conductor not entering the tower with the Company he is named for, his Company will have 50 faults put on.

Any Company not ringing through their Peal, and the Conductor refusing to enter the tower with the Company he is named to go in with, his Company will be disentitled to all moneys.

If any Company has a mistake during their Peal, and four clear belis cannot be heard out of the ten, 10 faults will be put on for every change, as long as it continues.

If any difference arises in the tower, the two men who are in at the time are responsible, and their word decisive.

After the ringing is over, and faults added up, the number of faults, and the names of the Companies to whom the Prizes are awarded, will be read out of the window of the Ramsden's Arms Inn, and the money distributed to the Conductor of each Company by the Committee in the same house.

These Rules and Regulations are sent out to avoid the inconvenience of reading them on the day of the contest, and will be strictly adhered to. Should any of them not be distinctly understood, it is particularly requested that enquiries should be made, on or before the day of entrance.

Our bells are in good condition. Weight of Tenor 18 cwt.

It is most particularly desired that all Companies who may enter for the Prizes, will conduct themselves with the strictest propriety, so as to give satisfaction to all concerned.

All communications and entrance money must be forwarded to Mr. John Garner, 39, West Parade, Huddersfield.

Being only for one day, we shall want to have the first Company ringing by a few minutes after Seven o'clock, a.m.
