heading to the Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Bosnia and Romania, and we are hoping to bring "love in a shoebox" to even more needy children.

Armitage Bridge Ringers

A Ten-Bell Contest at Huddersfield

In the May edition of "Focus", we reported on a striking competition that took place at St Peters, Huddersfield in 1865. These papers found in Birmingham and passed to us by Rebecca Kirby who, very kindly followed this up by obtaining the results from ringing historian John Eisel

The following article appeared in the Huddersfield Chronicle, Saturday 23rd September 1865.

Change Ringing. — On Monday next a trial of skill in the art of change ringing upon 10 bells, will take place at the Huddersfield Parish Church. The contest is open to all England, but as Monday was the last day for entrance, it is now known who will compete for the prizes, namely, Sheffield, Ashton, Oldham, Wakefield, Dewsbury, Bradford, Halifax and Leeds. All being well-known companies, some very good change ringing is expected. The following handsome prizes will be given, namely, 12 guineas, nine guineas, six guineas and three guineas; besides a sum of money to each of the companies who do not merit any of the prizes. It is 39 years since a trial of skill of the same kind took place in this town.

The results were published Huddersfield Chronicle, Saturday 30th September 1865; also reported in the Leeds Intelligencer.

Change Ringing Contest, - On Monday last a change ringing contest took place on the peal of 10 bells at the Huddersfield Parish Church. The method rung was Kent Treble Bob Royal, and the peal consisted of 1,600 changes, in three courses to be rung by each company who competed for the prizes. The following were the companies who entered and competed, viz:- Sheffield, Oldham, Ashton, leeds, Bradford, Halifax, Dewsbury and Wakefield — of whom the only company who did not get through their peal was Sheffield. The prizes were as follows:- 1st prize twelve guineas, 2nd prize nine guineas, 3rd prize six guineas and 4th prize three guineas; each prize in a handsome morocco purse. They were awarded to the following companies:- Bradford 1st, Wakefield 2nd, Halifax 3rd and Dewsbury 4th, and a guinea each company was given to the remaining four. The bells were opened at about six o'clock in the morning, with some first-class ringing by the

Huddersfield company, amongst whom was Mr John Hanson, who has been a ringer at the Parish Church since 1807, and is now 75 years old, and who rang his bell on Monday in first-rate style. The conductors of the several companies gave a vote of thanks to the censioners (who were of the Huddersfield company), for the fair and honourable way in which they had discharged their arduous duties. The whole affair was got up and carried through in the most respectable and straightforward way, and reflects great credit on the Huddersfield company, and the committee who have exerted themselves in promoting the contest. The streets surrounding the church were constantly filled during the day by the inhabitants and persons who had come from a distance, to hear the ringing, and the greatest interest was manifested as to who would ring the best peal, and obtain the prizes.

Ashton Standard also published the results, but with the addition that there had been some dissatisfaction re Dewsbury awarded 4th place, as it was considered by others present that some of the other players had excelled it.

John Garner representing the Ringing Contest Committee, tendered their thanks to The Public, for their liberal support, Huddersfield Chronicle 30th Sept 1865.

Our thanks to Rebecca and John for providing us with the information and, a competition which preceded this one in 1826, which we will print at a later date.
