Dear Friends

The month of September is that time when for some there is a lot of change. Our schools return after a summer break, teenagers set off for new jobs or college, and in Methodism it can be a time of welcoming new ministers at the start of our connexional year.

Change can be viewed in a number of ways. For some it is an exciting time, a time to begin new adventures. When I was in teaching, I always looked forward to meeting my new class and arranging the classroom with new displays to welcome them. Although I must admit when I was a child of primary school age going back to school was not high on my wish list.

Change can also be a time of great worry. As teenagers leave home for the first time the anxiety of parents so often comes to the fore. As a daughter or son applies for or begins a new job parents are on tenterhooks awaiting to see how things went.

For others change brings mixed feelings. This can especially be the case when we have to leave someone or something behind. When this happens, we can respond in two main ways. We can lament our loss and get stuck in living in the past. We liked things the way they were and so refuse to accept any change, even opposing it. Or we can lament our loss and then look to the future, look to the opportunities that can arise out of the change even if it has been forced upon us.

T.S Elliot wrote:

"to make an end is to make a beginning. The end is where we start from..."

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If we can adopt this attitude when it comes to change, then we might be surprised by what we discover. It is an attitude that sees what has come to an end as part of what is to be. Change does not necessarily mean forgetting all that has gone before but building on it. In fact, remembering and respecting what has gone before can so often help us avoid mistakes in the future.

Change can bring excitement and uncertainty, anxiety and enthusiasm. In it all let us remember that God is with us. As the prophet once said:

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jeremiah 29:11 NRSV)

September always is a turning-point in the year - the end of the summer holidays and the beginning of a new school year. The start of meteorological autumn but also the month when many churches hold harvest thanksgiving services.

Worldwide, and ecumenically, September 1 - October 4 (St Francis of Assisi's Day) is called the **Season of Creation** - the month when we remember all that God has created, animals, plants, fungi, microorganisms and the planet which is our home, and we pledge

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ourselves to treasure it and to play whatever part we can in reversing the global warming, loss of biodiversity and habitat destruction which face our world and have been caused by humans. St Francis is the patron saint of ecology and of peace-making, both of which are crucial for this task.

I hope we can all join in **World Clean Up** day on Friday September 20th, by litter-picking around the streets where we live, not just around the church. If you fill a bin-liner, please take a selfie of you with the sack and send it to us! I will sort out some litter-picker "tongs "for those who haven't got any and use good strong gloves too.

Our special **Harvest of Creation** service will be at St Paul's Church at 10am on September 29th, led by both the lay worship teams, from South Crosland and Armitage Bridge, and me and Chris and the Eco-Church group too.

September this year is about other things too. A joyful celebration of the life and ministry of **Holy Trinity Church South Crosland** takes place at 10am on September 1st, followed by a faith lunch. The sadness of the final service in the church building will be a week later on September 8th at 2pm. And the **vacancy continues** as we move towards the appointment of a new priest to our benefice. It is profoundly true that we are the sacred stones that make up the body of Christ, the church. But buildings are sacred space and precious to us - places where really important moments in our lives have happened.

I am going to end with lines for September from St Paul's beautiful letter to the Colossians.... Christ is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, for in him all things in heaven and on earth

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were created through him and for him. He himself is before all things and in him all things hold together. As God 's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience. Bear with one another ... you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. (From Chapters 1 & 3)

So, welcome to the Season of Creation - and the New Creation which God is always making from us and with us. God bless you / us all.

Armitage Bridge Ringers

We ourselves are mainly involved in the ringing of church bells but, we should not be deaf or unaware of the many different forms bells take and play in our culture. School bells, bicycle bells, clocks, fire bells, telephone bells, tubular bells, ships bells, tower bells, handbells and sacred bells are but a few on a very long list. Bells are found in various cultures including Christianity, their sound being the "voice" of God, and likewise the "voice" of Buddha in Buddhism. Bells were often worn by soldiers who imagined they would protect them in battle. Sailors thought a ships bell would keep them safe at sea and early monks carried them to ward off evil spirits. In one way or another bells share a very uneasy history with war. Most tower bells are made from an alloy of copper (80%) and tin (20%), both of these metals being significant elements in the manufacture of weapons. Ancient cannons to modern armaments have all been manufactured by many countries melting down to recycle bell metal.

As sad as this association to war is at the end of the conflict bells of war are often turned into bells of peace and remembrance. We ourselves ring our bells "half muffled" on remembrance Sunday, reading out the names on our war memorial while our tenor bell tolls out. Other nations have their own traditions. The bell of remembrance at Rovereto in Italy was cast in 1924 by using bronze from guns engaged in WW1, it is rung every evening to remember Italian soldiers killed in the war. The Peace Tower in Ottawa has a carillon of 53 bells (cast in London) for Canadian lives lost in WW1. There are many examples of peace bells around the world from a Shinto Shrine in New York to Cowra in Australia.

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In 1982 the World Peace Bell Association was founded in Tokyo and was supported by 120 countries, whose job it is to promote world peace. Duplicates of the UN peace bell were cast and distributed throughout the world to ring out each year on September 21st – International Day for Peace.

There are many famous bells, our own "Big Ben" being at the top of most folks list. Weighing in at 13.70 tonnes and tuned to E, it is surrounded by 4 smaller bells that chime the quarters. Known as "Westminster Chimes", Huddersfield Parish church has the same chime albeit on somewhat lighter bells.

The largest bell ever manufactured, or cast is the "Tsar Kolokol" which stands in the Kremlin in Moscow. The bell cracked during a fire while it was cooling down in the mould after casting. It remained below ground level in its pit for 100 years before being lifted out and placed on a large plinth in Red Square. The bell was never rung and has its broken section leaning up against it. The calculated total weight is around 200 tons, the broken piece is about 11 tons. Most bells of a significant weight are named, to give you a few examples

"Great Paul" (no guesses to its location) weighs in at 16 tons 14 cwt 2 qtrs 19 lb

"Great George" in Liverpool Cathedral is 14 tons 15 cwt 2 qtrs and 2 lb

"Big Ben", at Westminster comes at 13 tons 10 cwt 2 qtrs 15 lb "Great Peter", in York Minster 10 tons 16 cwt 2 qtrs and 22 lb

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The largest bell in a ringing peal is Liverpool Cathedral tenor "Emmanuel", cast by the Whitechapel Foundry, London in 1938 it's a hefty 4 tons 2 cwt 0 qtrs and 11 lb. Being the heaviest and highest ring in the world they are hung in a unique reinforced concrete frame. Our two latest recruits recently paid a visit and described the experience as "awesome".
